Permanent deacons serving the archdiocese for 40 years

A rapidly growing ministry in the United States is the restored permanent diaconate. Originating with the seven men called forth in Chapter 6 of the Acts of the Apostles, today there are more than 18,000 permanent deacons in the United States alone.

Following the restoration of the permanent diaconate at Vatican II in the mid-

1960s, the larger dioceses began ordaining permanent deacons. Next year, 2018, will mark the 50th anniversary of permanent deacons in the U.S.

Here in the Archdiocese of Dubuque, the first class of 15 men was ordained on Nov. 5, 1978. Thus, 2018 Deacon will be the 40th anniversary of the permanent diaconate in our

archdiocese. Over these past 40 years, 154 men, from 17 diaconal formation classes, have been ordained as permanent deacons by five different bishops. Permanent deacons are called to a vocation of service. In particular, they are ordained to serve God's peo-

ple through the three-fold ministries of

word, charity and liturgy.

With roots in the Acts of the Apostles, deacons are uniquely a part of the church with one foot planted firmly outside church settings, particularly ministering to the poor and marginalized. Thus, permanent deacons are called to a ministry that sacramentalizes the very diaconal nature of the church.

The 2018 celebration of 40 years of service is not intended for permanent deacons to say, "look at me – let's celebrate!" Rather, the focus of 40 years of service is to thank God for this gift to the church; to remember the many individuals or couples whose lives have been impacted by a deacon; to educate people on the role of the deacon and his varied relationships - spouse, family, archbishop, pastor, parishioners and the people he encounters in his community; to promote the charity ministries in which deacons are involved and to invite lay people to use their own gifts to join in these ministries; and to help deacons themselves grow in a deeper

Thus, in their planning for this 40th anniversary, permanent deacons invite the people of the Archdiocese of Dubuque to celebrate with them in four particular areas: promotion, education, action and celebration.

Promotion of the permanent diaconate involves a theme, "40 Years of Serving Through Liturgy, Word and Charity." An archdiocesan proclamation will identify the roles of permanent deacons. The 40th anniversary logo will symbolize the deacon's three ministries - the white stole over the cross represents the liturgical role; the book of the Gospels identifies the deacon's ministry of word; and the pitcher and bowl, representing Jesus' example of washing each other's feet, reflects the deacon's ministry of charity to those in need. A colorful poster depicting all of this will be made available to all parishes to display throughout 2018.

The archdiocesan publication, The Witness, will be used to help educate people about the permanent diaconate. Each month during 2018 a deacon will write an article sharing his own experiences of his vocational calling; his diaconal formation journey; his diaconal ministry, and how it all relates to his family. In addition, The Witness will also feature a weekly "Spotlight on a Deacon," which will be a short blurb with interest items, facts or Q&A's regarding the permanent diaconate. This short blurb will be made available to parishes to put into their parish bulletins. In addition, the deacon's monthly article and the weekly blurb will be put on a web page for extended viewing.

Action connected to the 40th anniversary will be taken from the permanent deacons' love for Scripture and the Liturgy of the Hours. The church has only two official liturgies: The Liturgy of the Eucharist (the Mass) and the Liturgy of the Hours, which is form of prayer praising God throughout the various hours of each day. As the prayer of the church, deacons pray Morning and Evening Prayer every day. Each day of the year, the same prayers are prayed throughout the world, whether in monasteries, convents, churches, rectories or homes. By praying the Liturgy of the Hours, the church and the world are united together in prayer. It is only natural, then, that deacons desire to share this precious gift with the members of their parishes. With the support of their pastor, deacons may be inviting all members of their parish to this special prayer. The Liturgy of the Hours is not just as option for parish prayer, but a responsibility of the faith community.

Finally, the deacons and wives plan to end the 40th anniversary with a grand celebration following their annual retreat on Oct. 28, 2018. Priests of the archdiocese will be invited to join the deacon community at a Mass, with Archbishop Jackels presiding. Bishop Thomas Zinkula will be the keynote speaker at a special program and dinner.

With this 40th Anniversary celebration in 2018, there is much for which to be grateful. The deacons of this archdiocese invite you to join with them in promotion, education, action and celebration. Who knows, perhaps the awareness of this vocation may inspire other men and women to listen for God's call in their life.
